

Introduction: Confusion

Definition: 1) to mix up, jumble together, put in disorder, 2) an inability to distinguish between things, bewilderment, 3) a lack of coherent, orderly thinking in the midst of complex problems, relationships, and decision making opportunities.

Syn – disorder, disarray, chaos, muddled

- **The Problem with Confusion:**

It immobilizes, paralyzes, de-motivates, and neutralizes individual and corporate progress and effectiveness.

- **The Cure for Confusion:**

A lesson from master teachers:

- Reduce Complexity = K.I.S.S.

- Increase Clarity = G.B.T.T.B.

Getting Back to the Basics:

Psalm 90

¹Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations. ²Before the mountains were born or you brought forth the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

Life is Short

³You turn men back to dust, saying, "Return to dust, O sons of men." ⁴For a thousand years in your sight are like a day that has just gone by, or like a watch in the night. ⁵You sweep men away in the sleep of death; they are like the new grass of the morning--
⁶though in the morning it springs up new, by evening it is dry and withered.

Sin is Serious

⁷We are consumed by your anger and terrified by your indignation. ⁸You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your presence. ⁹All our days pass away under your wrath; we finish our years with a moan. ¹⁰The length of our days is seventy years--or eighty, if we have the strength; yet their span is but trouble and sorrow, for they quickly pass, and we fly away.

Wisdom is Essential

¹¹Who knows the power of your anger? For your wrath is as great as the fear that is due you. ¹²Teach us to number our days aright, that we may gain a heart of wisdom.

Mercy is Available

¹³Relent, O LORD! How long will it be? Have compassion on your servants. ¹⁴Satisfy us in the morning with your unfailing love, that we may sing for joy and be glad all our days. ¹⁵Make us glad for as many days as you have afflicted us, for as many years as we have seen trouble.

Success is Possible

¹⁶May your deeds be shown to your servants, your splendor to their children. ¹⁷May the favor of the Lord our God rest upon us; establish the work of our hands for us--yes, establish the work of our hands.

6 Questions to Ask When You're Confused:

1. Am I rightly related to God?
2. Am I prepared to die?
3. Am I taking sin seriously?
4. Am I spending or investing my life?
5. Am I experiencing the joy of the Lord?
6. Am I impacting my world for good?
