“Who will be the greatest?”

Question: Greatest in the eyes of one another vs. Great in God's eyes?

Note: The final comment by Jesus was a future, a Kingdom, a greatness beyond their wildest dreams, but the focus was different; how to get there is radically different.

Right Thinking ⇒ Positive Emotions ⇒ Wise Behavior ⇒ Fruitful Consequences

Practice: Think GREAT Thoughts!

I. Since we are a product of our thought life, God commands us to “Think **great** thoughts.”

⁸Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is of good repute, if there is any excellence and if anything worthy of praise, dwell on these things. ⁹The things you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, practice these things, and the God of peace will be with you.

Philippians 4:8-9 (NASB)

- **The Command** is to think/dwell on these things.
- **Logizomai** – to consider, think on, reckon, to deduce, to reason, calculate, and ponder; to deliberate upon through protracted analysis and thought.

“It is not an unemotional or philosophical thought, but the very process of reasoning and deduction that separates good from evil.”

Some Practical Next Steps:

1. Begin with regular time in the Bible in a version you can understand.
2. Use a resource that will provide some structure, understanding, and additional insight. (*Daily Walk, Indeed, YouthWalk, One Year Devotional with God*, etc.)
3. Don't be overwhelmed, but develop a plan to read one book every month or two.
4. Enjoy the journey. It is not how many books you read, It's how deeply the ones you read sink into your life.

Practice: Pursue GREAT People!

He who walks with the wise grows wise, but a companion of fools suffers harm.

I. Why pursue great people?

A. God's Word is **emphatic** about the company we keep.

Do not be misled: "Bad company corrupts good character."

I Corinthians 15:33 (NIV)

Remember your leaders, who spoke the word of God to you. Consider the outcome of their way of life and imitate their faith.

Hebrews 13:7 (NIV)

¹⁵Even though you have ten thousand guardians in Christ, you do not have many fathers, for in Christ Jesus I became your father through the gospel. ¹⁶Therefore, I urge you to imitate me.

I Corinthians 4:15-16 (NIV)

As iron sharpens iron, so one man sharpens another.

Proverbs 27:17 (NIV)

B. Our baggage and backgrounds **demand** it!

- No one had a perfect parent.
- Wounds and deficits are normal.
- We must choose to deal with the damage constructively.
- God uses people to heal and restore our lives.

III. Get started without getting discouraged.

A **warning** to heed.

- For Timothy looking for Paul.
- For Paul looking for Timothy.

A **perspective** to consider.

“Role Players”

- Father figure
- Sponsor
- Cheerleader
- Seer
- Hero
- Expert
- Counselor
- Confidant

An **action** plan to follow.

- Pray earnestly
- Take initiative
- Start in your relational network
- Ask for help
- Persevere

God delights...

Practice: Dream GREAT Dreams!

²⁰Now to Him who is able to do far more abundantly beyond all that we ask or think, according to the power that works within us, ²¹to Him be the glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations forever and ever. Amen.

Ephesians 3:20-21(NASB)

I. How does God do it?

He invites ordinary people to dream something so great that it would be impossible if God did not do it.

The basis of sanctified dreaming:

1. God is **able**.

Ah Lord God! Behold, You have made the heavens and the earth by Your great power and by Your outstretched arm! Nothing is too difficult for You.

Jeremiah 32:17 (NASB)

"For nothing will be impossible with God."

Luke 1:37 (NASB)

2. God is **desirous**.

...but just as it is written, "Things which eye has not seen and ear has not heard, and which have not entered the heart of man, all that God has prepared for those who love Him."

1 Corinthians 2:9 (NASB)

3. God has **promised**.

Delight yourself in the Lord; and He will give you the desires of your heart.

Psalms 37:4 (NASB)

4. God **invites** us.

Ask of Me, and I will surely give the nations as Your inheritance, and the very ends of the earth as Your possession.

Psalms 2:8 (NASB)

¹²*"Truly, truly, I say to you, he who believes in Me, the works that I do, he will do also; and greater works than these he will do; because I go to the Father.*

¹³*Whatever you ask in My name, that will I do, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴If you ask Me anything in My name, I will do it."*

John 14:12-14 (NASB)

II. How God births dreams in His people?

- **Abram** – He commands us to step out of our “comfort zone.”
- **Joseph** – He puts a dream within our heart.
- **Moses** – He allows us to fail in our attempt to accomplish His dreams in our own power.
- **David** – He teaches us through adversity to love the “Dream-giver” more than “the dreams.”
- **Paul** – He clarifies our calling in times of crisis and often uses our worst failures as the platform of His future fulfillment.
- **Jesus** – The dream will cost us our life and appear to others as the height of folly just before God accomplishes the impossible through us.

III. How to develop bite-sized dreams for...

- Your **life**
- Your **marriage**
- Your **children**
- Your **career**
- Your **ministry**

IV. The process:

- **Write** it down
- **Read** it over regularly
- **Pray** over your dreams
- **Look** for God's intervention and direction

Conclusion:

God has a **dream** for you!

Introduction: A prayer I will never forget.

- Haiti – 1982

- A jungle compound – “hospital of pain.”

- The professor had a “secret weapon of power.”

Practice: Pray GREAT Prayers!

Five Characteristics of Great Prayers:

1. Great prayers are deeply **personal**.

- Great prayers begin and end with God, Himself.

Examples:

Jesus' teaching:

"Our Father" – Abba Father

Matthew 6:9 (NASB)

2. Great prayers are birthed in **brokenness**.

- Great prayers reflect our desperate dependency on Him.

Examples:

- | | |

| ○ Moses | Exodus 4:11-12 |
| ○ David | Psalm 51:16-17 |
| ○ Nehemiah | Nehemiah 1:3-4 |
| ○ Isaiah 6 | |

Jesus' teaching:

"Who is in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name."

Matthew 6:9 (NASB)

3. Great prayers **champion** God's agenda.

- Great prayers are prayed by people who understand God's agenda for His world.

Examples:

- Moses Exodus 32:9-14
- Nehemiah Nehemiah 1:10-11
- Solomon 1 Kings 3:7-14

Jesus' teaching:

"Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."

Matthew 6:10(NASB)

4. Great Prayers take God **seriously**.

- Great prayers are promise centered, not problem centered.

Examples:

- Moses
- Nehemiah Nehemiah 1:6-9
- David Psalm 103:6-10
- Paul Philippians 1, Ephesians 1, Colossians 1

Jesus' teaching:

"Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

Matthew 6:11-12 (NASB)

5. Great prayers demand great **courage!** Why?

- They are **DANGEROUS!**
- They boldly demand of God that He live up to His character.

Examples:

- Abraham Genesis 18
- Moses Exodus 32

- They dare to stand in the gap becoming the answer to the prayer if God wills it.

Examples:

Ezekiel 22:30-31

- Esther
- Nehemiah
- Jesus

Jesus' teaching:

"For Thine is the Kingdom, the power, and the glory forever and ever!" Amen.

Matthew 6:13b

Summary: Great prayers ask the **improbable**, expect the **impossible**, and receive the **unthinkable** because of Jesus.

- Because of Jesus' **command**, we boldly ask the **improbable**. Matthew 7:7-8
- Because of Jesus' **promise**, we expect the **impossible**. John 16:24
- Because of Jesus' **power**, we receive the **unthinkable**. Ephesians 3:20

Introduction: Did you ever wonder why God uses some people more than others?

Timeless Axiom

“Every Christian’s life is marked by ‘windows of opportunity’ that demand that they take a **radical step of faith** in order to follow Christ and fulfill His agenda for their life.”

- What makes these steps of faith “**radical**” is that they always involve **significant personal risk!**
- Where there is **no risk** there is **no faith!**

Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	there is no power
Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	there is no joy
Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	there is no intimacy with God
Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	there is no supernatural miracles
Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	there is no reward
Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	it is impossible to please God
Where there is <u>no</u> Faith	–	there is hollow religious activity, moralistic rules, and dead orthodoxy

Practice: Take GREAT Risks!

“and without faith it is impossible to please God...”

Hebrews 11:6 (NIV)

I. God's calling on our lives always demands we take great risks!

A. Old Testament examples of great risk takers:

- Abram - leaves his home, his land and his family.
- Moses - returns to his home to deliver God's people.
- David - fighters a giant that others refuse to face.
- Esther - confronts evil in the highest position of authority.

B. New Testament examples of great risk takers:

- Peter - leaves home, business, and future to follow Christ.
- Paul - returns to those who he sought to kill to obey God's call for his life.
- Jairus - fighters the religious status quo and lays his reputation and career on the line to seek help for his daughter.
- The woman with the issue of blood - confronts her fears and her culture to touch Jesus and be healed.

II. What do all great risk takers have in common?

- **Fear** – of what might happen.
- **Faith** – to “step out” in spite of their fear.
- **Favor** – God's reward and blessing on their life.

III. How to become a great risk taker (GRT) for the glory of God:

A. Refocus your **fear**.

Hebrews 10:38-11:3 (NIV)

³⁸*But my righteous one will live by faith. And if he shrinks back, I will not be pleased with him.* ³⁹*But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who believe and are saved.*

¹*Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see.*

²*This is what the ancients were commended for.* ³*By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible.*

Summary: GRT's fear the loss of God's favor more than the loss of people or things.

B. Rejuvenate your **faith**.

Hebrews 11:4-6 (NIV)

- By starting with "little things." – Abel

⁴*By faith Abel offered God a better sacrifice than Cain did. By faith he was commended as a righteous man, when God spoke well of his offerings. And by faith he still speaks, even though he is dead.*

- By pondering "big things." – Enoch

⁵*By faith Enoch was taken from this life, so that he did not experience death; he could not be found, because God had taken him away. For before he was taken, he was commended as one who pleased God.*

- By remembering the “main thing.” – pleasing God

⁶And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him.

Summary: GRT's see faith as a verb and not a noun.

C. Recall God's faithfulness.

Hebrews 11:7-40

- Noah – saves the human race
- Abraham – becomes a great nation
- Sarah – gets a child
- Moses – delivers God's people
- Daniel – is delivered from the lion's den
- Jericho's wall falls down
- Rahab – becomes a hero
- David – becomes a king

Summary: GRT's believe God's “invisible promises” for tomorrow are more reliable than the “visible pleasures” of today.

Personal application – your next step:

By faith, what risk does God want you to take in order to please Him?

- Is there something or someone to leave?
- Is there something or someone to return to?
- Is there something or someone to confront?
- Is there something or someone to fight for?

Introduction: Pondering the Power of “Sacrifice”

“Sacrifice” – The act of giving up, destroying, or permitting injury to, or foregoing something valued for the sake of something having a more pressing claim.

Webster's Dictionary

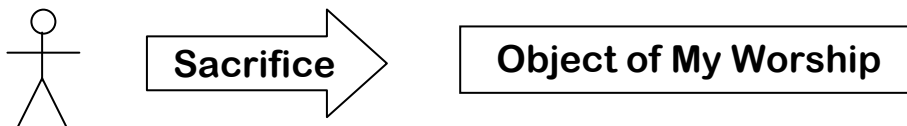
Great sacrifices, even in movies, art, music, or athletics produce a profound and almost inexplicable emotional and spiritual response.

- We admire those who make **great sacrifices**.
- We enshrine those who make **great sacrifices**.
- We honor those who make **great sacrifices**.
- We reward those who make **great sacrifices**.
- We seek to emulate those who make **great sacrifices**.

Why? – What is this mystical union and soul connection we subconsciously make when we witness a **great sacrifice** for a noble cause, or a personal relationship?

Answer – Sacrifice is the clearest and greatest evidence of the extent of one's love and devotion toward a person, a cause, or a thing. (John 15:13)

- ❖ In short, sacrifice is “the arrow” that points toward who or what we worship.
(Ascribe worth, importance, value to)



I. Understanding Biblical sacrifice and worship:

A. Lessons from Leviticus:

Chapters 1-10

- 5 Offerings prescribed for worship in the Old Testament.
 - 2 Compulsory Offerings = sin, guilt
 - 3 Voluntary Offerings = burnt, grain, peace

Summary: Access to God demands a sacrifice; fellowship with God grows through sacrifice.

B. Lessons from the life of Abraham:

Genesis 22

- The Requirement
- The Response
- The Result

Summary: God periodically tests the singularity of our devotion through sacrifices.

C. Lessons from the teachings of Jesus:

Luke 14:25-35

- The Call
- The Cost
- The Cause

Summary: Jesus demands absolute supremacy in our hearts as a condition for being His follower.

D. Lessons from the Apostle Paul:

Romans 12:1

Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—this is your spiritual act of worship.

Summary: The sacrifice God requires is “my life” 24/7 surrendered to Him to do His will.

II. What motivates great Christians to make great sacrifices?

A. They grasp God's unconditional love.

A deep sense of brokenness ...

Psalms 51:16-17

over their own sin, indebtedness to God's grace...

1 Timothy 1:15-16

and gratitude for God's mercy and forgiveness.

Luke 7:47

“I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven—for she loved much. But he who has been forgiven little loves little.”

Jesus ~ Luke 7:47 (NIV)

B. They embrace God's relational economy.

God measures our love/devotion not by the size of our gifts, but by the size of our sacrifice. (Luke 21:2)

“...This poor widow has put in more than all the others.”

Jesus ~ Luke 21:3 (NIV)

C. They trust God's eternal goodness.

An absolute conviction that the rewards for their sacrifice far out-weigh the cost. (Mark 10:28-31)

“...no one who has left home, or brothers, or sisters, or mother, or father, or children, or fields for me and the gospel will fail to receive a hundred times as much in this present age...and in the age to come eternal life.”

Jesus ~ Mark 10:29-30 (NIV)

D. They recognize God's sovereign ownership.

An acute awareness that **great sacrifice** is not praiseworthy, but a privilege, since all we have belongs to Him. (1 Chronicles 29:14-18)

But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to give as generously as this? Everything comes from You, and we have given You only what comes from Your hand.

David ~ 1 Chronicles 29:14 (NIV)

III. Next Steps to Becoming Great in God's Eyes:

- Have you surrendered your whole life to Christ as a living and holy sacrifice?
- Are you growing in loving God with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength?
 - Evidences might include the following:
 - Your heart – revealed by your financial sacrifice.
 - Your mind – renewing your mind with God's Word.
 - Your soul – deep talks with God and personal worship.
 - Your strength – serving in ministry to others.

Conclusion – Sacrifice is merely “love with clothes on.”

Where there is great love there will always be **great sacrifices**.

I. Why is it so important to enjoy great moments?

- It reminds us of God's goodness. Psalm 84:11

- It sustains us in adversity. Nehemiah 8:10

- It honors God as the source of all our joy. James 1:17

- It connects our hearts to those we love.
 - Mary "treasured these things in her heart." Luke 2:19

 - Jesus "eagerly awaited to share the feast with His disciples." Luke 22:15

- It's how God renews our...
 - bodies with rest ~ Sabbath

 - hearts with laughter ~ Proverbs

 - souls with life ~ Psalms

II. What keeps us from enjoying great moments?

A. A distorted view of God.

Luke 15

B. A warped theology of "pleasure."

- Old Testament Feasts
 - Private Feasts
 - Communal Feasts – Commanded by God
 - Weekly festival = The Sabbath
 - Monthly festival = The New Moon
 - Annual festivals = Passover, Pentecost, Booths, Day of Atonement
- New Testament Life and Teaching
 - Jesus' Words and Works
 - The Command 1 Timothy 6:17

C. Unwillingness to face our mis-beliefs and/or unhealthy behavior patterns.

- The Workaholic : Work defines your life, so your best energy is spent there.
- The Perfectionist: Long hours are required to make every task flawless.
- The Approval Seeker: Work piles up because your fear of "saying no" to others.
- The Escapist: Work provides an escape from painful relationships or other problems.
- The Materialist: An insatiable desire for possessions drives you to increase your work load.

III. How can you learn to enjoy great moments?

➤ Slow down - Ruthlessly eliminate hurry from your life. Psalm 46:10

➤ Slim down - Do less, so you can enjoy it more. Luke 10:41-42

➤ Sit down - Stop living "for" tomorrow, or "because of" yesterday;
enjoy this very moment.

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

➤ See around - What blessing from God could you celebrate today?

Psalm 34:1-2

Conclusion: Great Christians schedule/plan great moments!

Introduction: Who's the greatest in God's eyes?

- A **bold** request

³⁵Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Him. "Teacher," they said, "we want You to do for us whatever we ask." ³⁶"What do you want Me to do for you?" He asked. ³⁷They replied, "Let one of us sit at Your right and the other at Your left in Your glory."

- An **indignant** response

• **Follow Jesus' 4-fold process of empowering great people:**

1. **Bring** them in.

- Model the message
- Invite them into the action
- Engage them in authentic relationships

He appointed twelve—designating them apostles—that they might be with Him and that He might send them out to preach...

2. **Build** them up.

- Affirm their strengths
- Inspire their dreams
- Confront their flaws

- Equip their hands

“To Do” Lists - The Necessity of **focus**.

5. The Principle of Inertia:

➤ Do it **now!**

³⁰I passed by the field of the sluggard, and by the vineyard of the man lacking sense;
³¹And behold, it was completely overgrown with thistles, its surface was covered with nettles, and its stone wall was broken down. ³²When I saw, I reflected upon it; I looked, [and] received instruction. ³³"A little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest, ³⁴then your poverty will come [as] a robber, and your want like an armed man."

6. The Principle of Restoration:

➤ Turn it **off!**
